Due to the rounding methods used, figures may not always equal the sum of the parts. When rounding to the nearest 10, numbers ending in 5 have been rounded to the nearest multiple of 20 to prevent systematic bias.

Introduction

This is an annual publication containing information on the strength of UK Reserve Forces, including Regular and Volunteer Reserves, broken down by Service. It uses data from the Ministry of Defence Joint Personnel Administration System (JPA) and single Service systems.

The tables provide information about the patterns of change in the composition of the UK's Reserve Forces for the three most recent years. Historic 5-year, 10-year, and 20 year figures are also presented to provide context.

Key Points

- The strength of the UK Volunteer Reserve forces was 39,420 at 1 April 2010, a decrease of 2,110 on 1 April 2009.
- The strength of the Naval Service Volunteer Reserve, comprising the Royal Naval Reserve, the Royal Marine Reserve, and University Units, was 3,590 at 1 April 2010, a decrease of 40 on 1 April 2009.
- The strength of the Army Volunteer Reserve, including University Units was 33,130 at 1 April 2010, a decrease of 2,190 on 1 April 2009.
- The strength of the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, including University Units was 2,700, an increase of 130 on 1 April 2008.

Background

The overall strength of the Reserve Forces has been steadily decreasing since 1990, across all three Services. The Volunteer Reserves strength overall and in the Naval Service and Army has also decreased. However, the Volunteer Reserves strength in the RAF has increased.

Key Changes in 2010

In accordance with an agreement made between DASA and the UK Statistics Authority, from 2010, Cadets strengths are no longer published. This enables DASA to publish Reserve Forces data alongside DASA's other annual Tri-Service publications. Cadets data can be found in DASA's UK Defence Statistics publication, which is due to be published on September 29th 2010.

Sources and Data Quality Notes

Regular Reserve

Data on Naval Service Regular Reservists at 1 April 2007, 2009 and 2010, Army Regular Reservists, and Royal Air Force Individuals Liable to Recall at 1 April 2008, 2009 and 2010 are not included in this publication. Tri-Service Regular Reserve data were not migrated across from legacy systems onto the Joint Personnel Administration (JPA) system, and any data subsequent to its introduction have been sourced from the single Services where available. The absence of Naval Service Regular Reserve data in 2006 and 2007 was caused by the disestablishment of the secretariat responsible for the compilation of Naval Service Reserve data. In 2008, data were compiled by a reorganised secretariat, however concerns over the quality of the source data prohibited publication of the 2009 and 2010 Naval Service Regular Reserve data.

Due to discontinuity in time series data, no graphs for Regular Reserve data are presented.

Volunteer Reserve

Volunteer Reserve data appear on the JPA system, however there are known issues with the quality of the data. Naval Service Volunteer Reserve data at 1 April 2008 onwards were therefore sourced directly from the Naval Service. Army and Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve data for 2008 onwards were sourced from JPA, however validation is ongoing and as such the figures presented here are provisional.

DASA have initiated a major review of all historic JPA data and aim to revise provisional data (if necessary) during the course of 2010. No further data will be finalised until then. Revisions to strength figures are likely to be small. In addition, the Ministry of Defence is undertaking to improve the quality of Army Reserves data, with a view to correcting the recording of Contract Types and Assignment Types as referred to in Table 3, footnote 4.


